# THE WORD THIS WEEK

Last week it was sheep: this week, the vine. Jesus offers us another (agricultural) image to explain the mystery of his offering of himself, and our belonging to him, our being part of him, which comes about through the sacrament of Baptism. This is, as was stated earlier, the period of Mystagogy, when the newly baptised are helped to see what life in Jesus Christ really means. Today this comes out strongly for all of us, with two of the three readings emphasising the moral aspects of life in Christ: it is not simply enough to "belong" to him: our belonging must be shown by the works we do, by the fruits we bear - while remembering of course that we cannot bear fruit except in him.

# **Sunday Donation Envelopes**

# **CAFOD Emergency Appeal**

The people of Sudan need our help urgently. CAFOD is launching an emergency appeal for donations to get aid to them on the biggest scale they can muster. When violence broke out last year in Sudan between government and paramilitaries, most aid agencies evacuated. Now, humanitarian workers are struggling to get back into Sudan to help, meaning severe delays in getting aid to the people, and the challenges of getting into areas where fighting is still going on remain. Many borders are shut as the government say they need to keep weapons out. How your donations can help in Sudan: CAFOD's local partners are already responding. But they need urgent support to drastically increase their emergency response. Food: Millions of families who have been forced to flee their homes due to conflict and are now facing yet another urgent crisis - hunger. Dona-



tions now will help provide emergency food packages, as well as other essentials like medicine. **Water:** Water pipelines have been damaged, meaning that families are having to fetch water from unsafe locations. With your support, we can work to repair damage to pipelines and build new ones so that clean water can reach the communities who need it. **Sanitation:** We are providing emergency sanitation in several of Sudan's largest refugee camps. This is a desperate need especially for the sick, the elderly, those with young children. There will be a retiring collection after Masses next

# Day of Prayer for Survivors and Victims of Abuse

Tuesday 30th April is the Day of Prayer for Survivors and Victims of Abuse. Celebrated each year on the Tuesday of the Fifth Week of Easter, it is a day on which the Catholic Church in England and Wales holds in particular prayer all who have been abused, in whatever way, by another, whether within the Church or any other setting. It is a day not only to recommit ourselves as Church to learn from past mistakes and make the Church a safe setting for all but also a day to reflect on the Church's ministry of healing and welcome to Survivors/Victims. At 6.00 p.m. on Tuesday 30th April Bishop John will celebrate Mass to mark this Day at St. Patrick's, Livesey Street, Collyhurst. All are warmly invited to join him.

# **First Holy Communions**

The next two Saturdays see the celebration of First Holy Communion for our Year 3 children who have been preparing for this day for so long! Please remember to pray for them and their families at this time, especially that this gift may be for our young friends the beginning of a new relationship with Jesus within the family of the Church in our parish.

# BIBLE BITZ II

## 18: Saint Paul's Letter to Saint Titus

A lot of what we said about the two letters Paul wrote to Timothy can also apply to this letter to Titus: it was a personal letter, addressed to Paul's friend, companion and protégé after he had been entrusted with leading the Christian community on the island of Crete (what we would call a Bishop). It would also probably have been circulated and read in the

churches, and so also has a more "public" feel as well as being a private letter. As usual, the context is important: Paul is about to be arrested and sent to Rome—this letter is a sort of "farewell to the East" as Paul prepares to travel West and witness to Jesus in the other half of the Empire—he was actually planning to go to Spain, before he was arrested. Before he leaves, he has entrusted Titus with sorting out some problems in Crete, especially with character and responsibilities of the "elders" ("presbyters" in Greek, priests in English!) So Paul begins by reminding Titus why he sent him to Crete—"to put right what was defective", especially in appointing leaders in the community. Personal behaviour is the key, and Titus is told to encourage everyone in the church to be aware of the manner of life they should be living, especially by the example of his own life, living "in this world as responsible perons, upright and serving God." (2:12) Paul might sound a little severe in this letter, but he tempers it by referring to his own transformation from one who was "foolish, disobedient and misled." (3:3) Through the power of Jesus Christ everyone has the possibility of changing, or embracing the new life that Jesus has won for us. Paul ends this letter (and our following his thoughts in the New Testament) with a very simple heartfelt salutation: "All who are with me send greetings. Greet those who love us in the faith, Grace be to you all" (3:15)

# A Patron Saint for Everything ... 3: The Patron Saint of Dogs: Saint Rock



Last week we saw an "official" patron saint, proclaimed as such by a Pope. This week it is someone very unofficial! Many people would guess that the patron saint of dogs is Saint Francis of Assisi—after all, he is the patron of animals, wild-life and the environment. But dogs have their own special patron—Saint Rock (or Roch,

Roche or Rocco, depending on which language you are using!) Rock was born in Montpellier in France around 1350, to a well-off family. At the age of 20 he abandoned his wealth and joined the Third Order of Saint Francis, and set off for Italy, where a plague was raging. Rock set himself to serve the sick, especially victims of the plague, but ended up contracting it himself. He took himself off to a lonely forest, living as a hermit, so that he would not infect others. But there, one day, he was found by a hunting dog of a local nobleman, which then visited him each day, bringing bread stolen from the nobleman's table! Rock was also suffering from serious wounds which

the dog licked well again. Eventually the nobleman wondered where his dog was wandering off to, found the saint and brought him to his castle to heal. When recovered, Rock resumed his wandering—but the dog went with him, and stayed with him for the rest of his life, even when he was mistakenly arrested and imprisoned. This loyalty and companionship of the hunting dog is why Saint Rock is patron of dogs and those who love them. In art he is always depicted showing the wound on his leg, with the dog at his side, a loaf of bread in its mouth.
