We often live our lives leaving such things to a distant, shadowy future like the person who is going to fix that faulty lock or window-frame, but in the end doesn't get round to it before the burglar comes. The lamps of our lives should be lit and shining, filled to the brim with the oil of prayer and charity, "singing the hymns of the fathers" as we wait for the Master to return.

NEWS AND NOTES

Money Matters ...

Last week I announced that our bank account had been emptied by some sudden billsnamely fuel bills and the annual water bill, and I asked that for the next few weeks people could give a little more in the Sunday collection to try and build up our balance. You will be aware that bills have increased for all of us: here we have much larger spaces to heat and light than a domestic home, and so our bills are proportionately larger! For example, in the first half of this years our fuel bills came to £10,850.58. Also this year our insurers have demanded a lot of new compliance certificates, each of which has taken a big bite out of our maintenance budget: add all these various non-negotiable expenses, such as Insurance, Diocesan Levies and Council Tax (£10,957.40), Wages and Salaries (£9,272.26) and Repairs and Maintenance (£10,080,77) and our outgoings are already £41,161.01. Compare this with our income for the same period which is £34,322.79 and you can see the problem! This isn't cause for panic, because things average out over the course of a year—for example Summer fuel bills are much lower, and we get our GiftAid refund in one lump sum later in the year. Nevertheless, at the moment we need to build up our balance a wee bit, so please, if you can, give a little extra for the next couple of weeks! Thank you! As promised there will be more about general fundraising in September—watch this space!

Holy Day of Obligation

A reminder that this Friday is a Holy Day of Obligation—the Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary: there are Masses here at 9.30 a.m. and 6.30 p.m. on Friday. This feast is

not just about Mary—celebrating how, at the end of her life she shared in the physical resurrection of her Son, being "assumed" body and soul into heaven—it is also about us, because the same promise of physical resurrection is made to us, that one day we will be remade and join Jesus and Mary in a new heaven and a new earth.

August Fun Day

This year it will be taking place on the afternoon of **Sunday 31st August** in our Parish Centre (and grounds if weather allows!) from 2.00—5.00 p.m. There will be the usual mix of fun and games for old and young, with a licensed bar, barbecue, teas and coffees, Irish coffees, cake stall, children's tuck shop, pottery stall, ice cream and bouncy castle! Tickets are £1.00 per person, which includes entry to the Grand Raffle and ten "tokens" for games (note food and drink are not included), and are now available from the Piety Stall in the porch.

While on the subject ...

Please have a think about baking some cakes for the Fun Day—these can be dropped off on Saturday 30th or the Sunday morning: the more the merrier! Also if anyone would like to donate a substantial raffle prize—we already have as a prize a luxury executive gaming chair worth £150, but any other big prizes would be gratefully received!

Getting to Know Pope Leo

You may have seen on the news images of Pope Leo's Mass with over a million young people during the "Jubilee for Youth" at Tor Vergata outside Rome last Sunday—including our bishop and young pilgrims from Salford! In his address Pope Leo said:

"We need to lift our eyes, to look upwards, to the "things that are above" (Col 3:2), to realize that everything in the world has meaning only

insofar as it serves to unite us to God and to our brothers and sisters in charity, helping us to grow in "compassion, kindness, humility, meekness and patience" (Col 3:12), forgiveness (cf. ibid., v. 13) and peace (cf. Jn 14:27), all in imitation of Christ (cf. Phil 2:5). And in this way we will grow in an ever deeper understanding of what it means that hope does not disappoint, because the love of God has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us (cf. Rom 5:5). Dear young people, Jesus is our hope. It is he, as Saint John Paul II said, "who stirs in you the desire to do something great with your lives [...] to commit... to improving yourselves and society, making the world more human and more fraternal." Let us remain united to him, let us remain in his friendship, always, cultivating it through prayer, adoration, Eucharistic Communion, frequent Confession, and generous charity, following the examples of Blessed Piergiorgio Frassati and Blessed Carlo Acutis who will soon be declared saints. Aspire to great things, to holiness, wherever you are. Do not settle for less. You will then see the light of the Gospel growing every day, in you and around you. I entrust you to the Virgin Mary, Our Lady of Hope. With her help, as you return to your countries in the coming days, in every part of the world, continue to walk joyfully in the footsteps of the Saviour, and spread your enthusiasm and the witness of your faith to everyone you meet! Have a good trip home!"

WOMEN OF THE OLD TESTAMENT 5: Rachel

Sadly, Rachel does not seem to be a very likeable character! She hates and constantly belittles her older sister Leah, she badgers and berates her husband, Jacob, and almost causes a family war by stealing her father's "household gods" when they move back to Canaan! Her story, however, begins beautifully, when the young Jacob, visiting her father, waters her livestock and the two fall in love. Jacob is willing to work for Laban for seven years to win her hand in marriage—only to be deceived by Laban who substitutes Leah. But then Jacob works another seven years in order to marry Rachel too! A definite love story! But then things start to go wrong: Rachel is childless, which deepens her resentment of Leah, who has already had four children. Eventually Rachel has two sons with Jacob: Joseph, who became Jacob's favourite, and Benjamin, whose difficult birth ended Rachel's life. As we have said before with these Old Testament stories of rather dysfunctional families, perhaps the point is that God works through ordinary, fallible human beings: Jacob's love for Rachel was continued in his favouritism of her son Joseph, which led to his brothers selling him into slavery in Egypt, where he would eventually save his whole family in time of famine.

Cemetery Mass at Wardley



THE SACRAMENTS

Home Communions

Baptisms

...are by appointment: please collect, fill in and return one of the Information forms from the porch. They provide details of what is required and the next steps in the process.

Marriage

...is by appointment. Please take an information leaflet from the porch and return the tear-off portion to arrange an interview. Do not make bookings before the interview. Six months' notice is required.

Anointing of the Sick

Please call the Presbytery to ask for this Sacrament. It should not be left until the last minute, but the sick should celebrate this sacrament to receive God's healing and comfort.

Confirmation and First Holy Communion

First Holy Communion is normally in Year 3: families of children in Saint Vincent's Primary School will be contacted in September, otherwise please speak to Father James. Confirmation is in Year 8—again children in Catholic High School will be invited directly, otherwise please have a word!
