# THE WORD THIS WEEK

A few weeks ago (22nd Sunday in Ordinary Time) we had a Gospel about humility in social life - today we hear the Lord reiterating the message, but this time in reference to our prayer lives. The two Gospels are linked by the last words today, which also appear in the other story: "Everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, but the one who humbles himself will be exalted." This phrase is obviously a key part of our Lord's teaching! The sin of 'self-exaltation' consists in putting others in a lower place - as the Pharisee does to the tax collector. Perhaps the most telling phrase in today's Gospel is where Jesus refers to the Pharisee saying this prayer "to himself," rather than offering it to God! And since the Pharisee wasn't really talking to God, how could he expect to be heard?

# **OCTOBER ROSARY**

This month is traditionally devoted to the recitation of the Rosary. There's still one more week of October to go—we are reciting the Rosary after Mass on weekdays, and everyone is encouraged to "have a go" at this simple but profound type of prayer. We will be praying five mysteries of the Rosary after Mass on weekdays (Monday to Friday) throughout October: if you would like to lead, please sign up on the list in the porch.

# **BOOK OF THE DEAD**

With November coming up we will shortly be reprinting the Book of Names behind the organ. Next to the book are some little cards to fill in to ADD names to the book—all names currently included will remain. Please complete this by this **Sunday 26th October**.

# NOVEMBER MASSES FOR THE DECEASED

In November we pray especially for the Holy Souls, and there are several Masses throughout the month: All Souls Day itself is this year transferred to **Monday 3rd November** (since we are celebrating All Saints on the 2nd), and there will be two Masses here that day at 9.30 a.m. and 6.30 p.m. There will be a Requiem Mass for deceased clergy on **Tuesday 18th November**. As well as these our First Friday Mass on **7th November** will also be a Requiem Mass—but celebrated in Latin: this will not be a "Tridentine" Mass, but the same Mass as usual. This might

be nostalgia for some, a curiosity for others, but it can remind us that Latin is still the "official" language of the Church! There will be a short pronunciation and responses practice before Mass at 6.00 p.m.!

# **CEMETERY MASS**

I have booked Rochdale Cemetery Chapel for a Mass on **Saturday 15th November** at 11.00 a.m. This Mass will be offered for all resting in the Cemetery and all whose committal was at the Crematorium—all are welcome, and please let others know who might have family or friends buried there. The Chapel is small, so it may be an outside Mass for some—please dress for the weather!


The next meeting of the S.V.P. Young Adults Group (18 to 35) will be in the parish centre at 7.30 p.m. on **Saturday 1st November**.

# **COMMUNION CHANGES**

Starting on 8th November we will be doing communion differently at Sunday Masses. As you probably know, our church is not best suited to movement at communion—especially for people who wish to take the chalice. So the new way of doing things will be in sections: the priest and minister with hosts will begin in the centre for people sitting in the two central sections of the Church, with ministers with the Precious Blood to left and right. People in the "side" sections will be asked to wait patiently: the priest and ministers will then MOVE to the sides (where they normally stand currently) to give communion to those people sitting at the sides. This will avoid people having to walk across queues to receive from the chalice or return to their places. Hopefully this will help make communion time more reverent, and also allow more people who so wish to consume the Precious Blood.

# WOMEN OF THE OLD TESTAMENT 17: ABIGAIL

Last week we met King David's second wife, Michal, daughter of King Saul: he already had a first wife, Ahinoam, and today we meet his third wife, Abigail. This is a name that we are probably more familiar with, since Abigail has come down through the Bible story as a woman of beauty, fidelity, faith and wisdom. An Israelite woman, she was originally married to a man named Nabal, whose name means "Fool". He certainly seems to live up to that name: Abigail first meets David when Nabal has angered David, who arrives with troops to destroy him and his household. Without hesitation, Abigail rushes out and pleads for her husband, offering food and begging that David not shed blood in revenge, because God has promised him an "undying dynasty". David relents, raising Abigail's wisdom and thanking her for her intervention. Shortly after this Nabal dies, and David marries Abigail. A moment of peril comes when she and Ahinoam are captured by the Amalekites, before being rescued by David and his forces. They settle in Hebron, where Abigail bears David a son, called Chileab or Daniel. Later, when David becomes king and settles in Jerusalem, Abigail seems to disappear from the story—we do not know what happened to her. The only wife mentioned in Jerusalem is Michal,

# **ADVENT TALKS: REFLECTING ON** "DILEXI TE"



### **Home Communions**

...are by appointment: please collect, fill in and return one of the Information forms from the porch. They provide details of what is required and the next steps in the process.

### Marriage

...is by appointment. Please take an information leaflet from the porch and return the tear-off portion to arrange an interview. Do not make bookings before the interview. Six months' notice is required.

### **Anointing of the Sick**

Please call the Presbytery to ask for this Sacrament. It should not be left until the last minute, but the sick should celebrate this sacrament to receive God's healing and comfort.

### Confirmation and First Holy Communion

First Holy Communion is normally in Year 3: families of children in Saint Vincent's Primary School have been contacted; otherwise please speak to Father James.

Confirmation is in Year 8—again children in Catholic High School will soon be invited directly, otherwise please have a word!
